### High School of **Dundee pupil** named Scotland's top performer in SQA exams

#### Elle Wyatt wins SQA's 2017 Academic Excellence award as High School pupils score the top marks in the land in six subjects

A pupil from the High School of Dundee has been recognised as Scotland's top-performing student in the 2017 SQA exams.

Elle Wyatt was named as the winner of the SQA's Academic Excellence award at the qualification authority's 2017 Star Awards ceremony in Edinburgh.

Presented annually in respect of outstanding achievement in National Qualifications, the prestigious accolade was granted to Elle following her superb set of Advanced Higher level results. As well as gaining A band 1 passes in each subject she took - Mathematics, Physics, Chemistry, and Mathematics of Mechanics - at an average of 97%, Elle's performance in Physics earned her the joint top mark in Scotland (shared with another HSD pupil, Ivan Kapelyukh!), while in Mathematics she was also joint top in the country, courtesy of a perfect score of 100%.

Elle, who left the High School at the end of F6 and is now studying Natural Sciences at Cambridge University, said, "It's an enormous privilege to have received this award!

"Obviously, I couldn't make it to the awards ceremony, but my parents attended and Head of Physics Mr Darby collected the prize on my behalf."

The 17-year-old, who also achieved five A band 1 Highers last year, said she felt the key to her success had been working hard and doing subjects that she enjoyed.

She added, "Some of my teachers have been fabulous. I think I owe a lot to them - I couldn't have achieved as much without them."

Rector of the High School of Dundee, Dr John Halliday, said, "We encourage all our pupils to be the best they can be and for Elle this has meant coming out on top in the whole country; a fantastic achievement.

"Encouraged by her teachers, she has worked so hard for this success, showing flair and imagination as well as grit. What really pleases me also is that this success comes in the STEM subjects."

Elle's award completed a remarkable set of SQA distinctions for the High School this year, with its pupils having recorded the top, or joint top, results in three separate Advanced Higher subjects; Chemistry (Alex Smith), Mathematics (Elle Wyatt) and Physics (shared by Elle Wyatt and Ivan Kapelyukh).

What is more, for Alex Smith, scoring the best mark in the land completed an amazing Chemistry double as, 12 months previously, she had achieved the same distinction in the same subject at Higher level. And as she had also recorded the

Innovative sports programme launched best score in Scotland in Higher Biology in 2016, this year's achievement meant Alex had earned a hat-trick of top Scientific marks!

Furthermore, in 2017 High School of Dundee pupils gained the top, or joint top, marks in Scotland in three N5 subjects by virtue of 100% scores, with four (Joshua Cargill, Robert Connolly Brown, Elena Cotroneo and Amy Johnstone) obtaining the distinction in French, one (Elena Cotroneo) in Italian and five (Hannah Alijani, Anna Hudson, Tasnim Kouli, Caitlin Jones and Siddharth Sripada) in Mathematics.

Dr Halliday added, "To have three pupils who have achieved the top marks in Scotland in three different Advanced Higher subjects in one year is unprecedented at the High School – perhaps even in Scotland. It is so rewarding to see their efforts recognised and all the staff – teachers and support staff – are very proud of their successes.

"I am absolutely thrilled for the pupils. They all deserve this and it shows what can be done when young people are given the fantastic combination of nurture and challenge that we aspire to provide at the School."

### **Combined Cadet Force celebrates centenary**





On 16th February 1918, the first contingent of the Dundee High School CCF met for its very first parade, at the Douglas Street Drill Hall under the command of Capt JB Swan. As the Courier newspaper reported at the time, 'Over 40 cadets paraded and the lads showed great keenness and aptitude.'

To mark the 100th anniversary of that first parade for the – at the time – fledgling group, the School staged a special CCF Centenary Parade.

The parade in the School playground involved the whole 100+ current contingent of cadets, who were inspected by the Guest of Honour, one of the most senior Army officers in Scotland; Colonel Stephanie Jackman MBE TD, Assistant Commander 51 Infantry Brigade and HQ Scotland.

The championship-winning Drill Team displayed their skills and the Pipe Band performed in front of an audience that included parents, pupils, former pupils, former CCF members and guests associated with the group, and friends of the School.

Rector Dr John Halliday, said, "The idea of a cadet corps for the High School was first mooted during the Boer War of 1900, where a number of FPs saw active service.

"However, it was the First World War that provided the final motivation to set it up, and since then it has been a regular feature of the school, reflecting the social and educational changes of the subsequent century.

"Around 30 years ago the first girls were admitted and now it is a completely gender-mixed unit, modern and go-ahead, whilst adhering to the important traditional values of self-discipline, courage and respect. Here's to the next 100 years!"

Col Jackman said, "I feel very honoured and privileged to be here today. I think it's tremendous that the School can celebrate such an occasion.

"The cadets have done everybody proud, they were extremely well turned out and a credit to the School.

"Speaking to the cadets, they clearly thoroughly enjoy being part of the CCF. The cadet movement is all about maximising potential and that's a fantastic value to develop in any youngster."



Following its establishment in 1918, membership of the DHS CCF quickly grew and the contingent soon received rifles and uniforms. Since then, the CCF, along with the Pipes and Drums, has developed and evolved as an uninterrupted and high-profile feature in the life of both the school and, through participation in various public events, the wider community.

Today's cadets have the chance to develop, by means of a varied training programme, not only leadership but also the qualities of responsibility, self-reliance, self-confidence, resourcefulness, endurance, perseverance, teamwork and effective communication, as well as enhancing their personal and social development.

Lt Col Colin McAdam, Contingent Commander, said, "One hundred years on and the contingent is thriving, rising to challenges and developing team players and leaders as well as resilient, robust and confident individuals. I take great pride in my involvement in the past 25 years of DHSCCF."

Following the parade, those in attendance were invited to view an exhibition of CCF-related memorabilia and artefacts in Trinity Hall which, as well as providing a fascinating insight into the history of the group through the years, gave former members the chance to reminisce about their own time in the contingent.

"It was wonderful to have so many former CCF members join us for the occasion and to hear some of their treasured memories," added Dr Halliday.

The parade and the exhibition, which the School hopes to add to in the coming months, are the first in a number of events that the School is planning in commemoration of the centenary of the WW1 Armistice in November 2018.

### Happy ending for High School writer

Adding an unexpected twist to a well-known story has led to a happy ending for a talented Senior Years writer, but not for the tale's protagonist!

F6 pupil Hannah Cowieson's dark but humorous continuation of the story of Cinderella has been included in the SQA's Write Times 2, a brand-new publication show-casing the best creative writing produced by students from across Scotland who have completed English courses over the past year.

Hannah's Higher English creative folio piece, 'Gone Mad', tells the tale of the unfortunate events which befall Cinderella after she comes clean to Prince Charming about the manufactured circumstances of their meeting, and is one of just three compositions which were chosen to be illustrated by an artist.

And the story literally took centre stage at the launch event for the publication, which was held at Glasgow's Contemporary Arts Centre, when Hannah was – again one of only three authors – asked to read her piece to an audience that included Deputy First Minister, and Cabinet Secretary for Education, John Swinney MSP.

Hannah said, "This wasn't something I was expecting but I was really happy when I found out my story was being included.
Seeing my name in print will be very strange!"

The new book features more than 30 pieces – essays, prose, poetry, and drama – written by SQA candidates as part of their English courses at National, Higher, and Advanced Higher level, and also includes selected work from students who have achieved the Creative Industries: Media and Communication Higher National Certificate at college.

# School embraces Safer Internet Day

February saw the School embrace a global event aimed at making the internet a safer environment for all.

To celebrate Safer Internet Day, which promotes the safe and positive use of digital technology for children and young people, pupils throughout the Junior and Senior Years took part in a range of activities emphasising best practice in online activity.

PC Scott Menmuir, from Police Scotland and Dundee Community Safety Division, visited the school to talk to pupils in F1 and F2 assembly about a range of online issues, including the importance of staying safe and respecting themselves and others, and being careful about sharing personal information.

Pupils in F3-F6 meanwhile, worked together in the classroom to examine similar themes. In the Junior Years pupils from L1 through to L7 also received guidance on staying safe online, while, by acting out scenarios they might encounter online, some classes also explored the topic of what good internet practice entails.

Deputy Rector Lise Hudson said of the event, which is celebrated annually in around 130 countries across the globe, "We are delighted to support and endorse Safer Internet Day 2018.

"Our pupils receive regular guidance on how to stay safe online and use the internet and social media responsibly. With the lines increasingly blurred between real world and virtual world communication though, it is essential that we engage our young people in active and open dialogue and foster an environment where they can learn from their mistakes and use digital technology wisely in all aspects of their lives."

The show transported the audience to 1920s Berlin, to tell the story of a group of resourceful children tracking down and apprehending the evil Mr and Mrs Snow who have stolen young Emil's money, which he is taking to his grandmother.

Director of the show, Drama teacher Ellie Ashton, said, "The presence of streetwise city kids, and a hard-working single mother gives the story a relevancy for a modern-day audience.

"It's a story that explores the numerous grey spaces between the normal black and white worlds that children's stories normally inhabit. It dares to ask the difficult questions; 'How do we find our friends in the world?', 'How can we work together to defeat evil?', and 'Can children ever win against adults?'"

Despite the original performance dates being postponed due to the snow at the end of February, the cast pulled together to present a heart-warming and energy filled three nights of fun. Ellie said, "They acted like real professionals in the face of adversity, and we are incredibly proud of their efforts."

Before the bumper donation was handed over to the charity, Alison McDevitt and Kirsty Watt from the Eagles Wings Trust spoke to F5 Higher Modern Studies pupils about the work that they do and the subject of social inequality, which the pupils are investigating as part of their course.

History and Modern Studies teacher Karlene Douglas organised the collection and the talk. She said, "I am overwhelmed at the support from the school. Senior School pupils, parents and staff all donated and the picture doesn't do justice to the huge volume of donations!

"I was so impressed, as were Alison and Mike Cordiner, who came in to collect it. It didn't all fit in their van and the school janitors had to follow behind in a van as there was so much! Amazing!"

#### **Spectroscopy in a Suitcase**

In January, a team of university students unpacked a fascinating branch of science for some Senior Years pupils.

Postgraduates from the University of Edinburgh visited the School to deliver a workshop for



Advanced Higher Chemistry pupils as part of the Royal Society of Chemistry's Spectroscopy in a Suitcase programme.

The session gave the pupils the opportunity to learn about spectroscopy and spectroscopic techniques by giving them hands-on experience of the use of state-of-the-art analytical equipment. It also allowed them to find out about the application of the techniques in real-life contexts, including the investigation of murder.

Head of Chemistry, Dr Phil Taylor, said, "Spectroscopy is an important part of the Advanced Higher course but the equipment is too expensive to be available in schools.

"This workshop also gave our pupils experience of running infra-red spectra and, since the University has very kindly loaned us the equipment for a week, the pupils will be able to analyse their own samples. That gives our Advanced Higher Chemistry pupils a fantastic opportunity as although many of them have synthesised compounds as part of their Investigation, they would not usually be able to generate their own infra-red spectra."

The workshop for the pupils was followed by a staff training session. Having opened this up to other local schools, Dr Taylor was delighted that chemistry teachers from both Dundee and Angus schools were able to attend.



#### Global outlook in evidence

October saw some Senior Years pupils show that they were true internationalists as they turned their attention to diplomacy and world peace.


12 pupils travelled through to James Gillespie's High School in Edinburgh to take part in a Model United Nations Conference in which they rose to the challenge of representing their allotted countries in a series of globally-themed debates, committees and votes.

In recognition of the statesmanlike skill she demonstrated while representing Turkey in the politics committee, Anoushay Okhai, F6, was awarded the prize for Best Delegate, and with it, the committee chair's gavel.

In addition, James Shearer, F6, who represented India, and Callum Paterson, F6, who represented Saudi Arabia, were nominated as Highly Commended delegates for their efforts in the economic/science/culture committees and the politics committee respectively.

History and Modern Studies teacher Craig Melia, said, "It's a great achievement for the pupils who have worked hard, researching and practising discussing issues every Monday lunchtime since the start of term."

#### **Maths Week Scotland**

As part of the Scottish Government's first-ever Maths Week Scotland event, pupils across the Senior Years added a number of special activities to their lessons.

While F1 and F2 classes were busy taking part in the Mangahigh.com online maths competition, pupils in various year groups completed the challenges which made up the national 'Maths wi nae Borders' contest.

Pupils in F5 and F6 meanwhile had the chance to take some inspirational insight away from a Dundee University lecture in which mathematicians explained their love for mathematics and showcased its power to help make sense of the complex world around us.



# Pupils make Chinese connection

In January, a group of Senior Years pupils used their lunch break to attend a meeting with fellow students more than 9,000km away!

Taking advantage of the power of video calling, High School pupils were able to make a face-to-face connection with counterparts from the Jiang Xi Jiu Jiang Number One middle school in Jiangxi Province, China.

An eight-hour time difference meant that the Chinese pupils were in the middle of their evening classes, but the two groups soon found they had plenty in common.

After High School of Dundee Mandarin Teacher, Yunchao Murdoch, who organised the event, had introduced the High School to the pupils in China, Mrs Zhang in Jiang Xi took the opportunity to do the same for her school for the Dundee pupils. High School pupils Isla Hutchinson (F1) and Zoe Faloon (F2) then made a fantastic speech in Mandarin, before the two groups took it in turns to ask each other questions on subjects ranging from hobbies and school life to Christmas and computer games.

Yunchao said, "The pupils really enjoyed the experience and hopefully we will run the video conference more often in the future."

#### Big say for School's smallest children!



A group of Junior Years pupils have ensured that the School's smallest children can have a big say.

In January, members of the Pupil Voice team paid a visit to the High School of Dundee Nursery to involve children there in the pupil-led committee's discussions on a range of matters relating to school life.

The session was organised as part of the work the Pupil Voice Group has been putting into the Junior School's attempts to achieve Level 1 stage of Unicef's Rights Respecting Schools Award, for which a demonstration of commitment to article 12 of the UN Convention on the Rights of the Child – the right to voice your opinions and have them taken seriously – is crucial.

With that in mind, the Junior Years pupils ran a card-sorting activity about needs and wants, then had a look at the Unicef Child Rights Launchpad game and considered the right to an education which develops talents and skills. As a final activity, the children created pictures featuring themselves and their own talents and skills.

# Pupil takes runner-up spot in prestigious writing contest

High School pupil Anoushay Okhai has been named as joint runner-up in one of Scotland's most highly-regarded school literary competitions.

Anoushay, F6, earned the distinction in the Scottish Schools' Young Writer of the Year award, an annual nationwide contest which challenges 15 to 18-year-old pupils to write a non-fiction piece on a contemporary issue for an intelligent magazine or serious newspaper.

The 17-year-old's entry, The Taste of Success, which addresses colonialism and how we are not taught enough about it, was one of only four entries to make the final shortlist for the title. And although Anoushay lost out at the final hurdle, her piece drew praise from the adjudicators, with one describing it as being a 'Brilliant piece of writing with lucid arguments supported by relevant and often devastating facts.'

Anoushay said, "What inspired me was that the theme of colonialism kept coming up in the news and as a background of things I was studying, and I didn't know anything about it.



"I've always liked writing and wanted to integrate it into my studies and career. This was completely unexpected. I was really pleased about it and it's given me a lot of confidence."

The competition was organised by the Institute of Contemporary Scotland (ICS), in association with the Young Programme charity, and featured on the Scottish Review website.



## Piping-hot performances rewarded

High School of Dundee pipers enjoyed success at a national level during the autumn term.

A ten-strong High School contingent travelled through to Fettes College in Edinburgh in November to compete against groups from all the other main independent schools in the 2017 Scottish CCF Pipes and Drums Committee's annual Trios and Quartets Competition.

Rising to the challenge, the team of Craig Gunn (F4), Tom Dalglish (F4) and Ross Mauritzen (F2) earned themselves 3rd place in the Trios section, and with it a shield for their efforts.

Recent times have also seen High School pupils rewarded for some piping-hot performances in local competitions.

One result of particular note was Alan Cunningham's victory in the Novice Piping 12-&-Under category at the Vale of Atholl Pipe Band Junior Competition in Pitlochry in January. The L6 pupil's win means that he will no longer be able to compete as a novice; at the age of ten he has already progressed to U15 competitions!

# Nursery children demonstrate model craftsmanship

### The High School remembers

In November, the School paid tribute to the fallen with its traditional Armistice Parade and Service.

To remember all those members of the High School community and beyond who have died in all armed conflicts, the School's Combined Cadet Force completed a parade in front of the school.

The ceremony, which was watched by pupils, staff, members of the public and guests, concluded with a wreath being placed in front of the School's war memorial by Head Boy Nicoll Butter and Head Girl Caitlin Mitchell, assisted by Junior Years pupils Angus Brown and Ava Newton.

Since 2014, during the annual ceremony, the School has poignantly been marking the centenary of the First World War by commemorating those members of the school community who were killed in the conflict.

This year the names of 30 former pupils and one member of staff who lost their lives in WW1 between November 1916 and November 1917, many of them at the infamous Battle of Passchendaele, were read out by Nicoll and Caitlin.

A prayer was also delivered by The Provost of St Paul's Cathedral, the Very Reverend Jeremy Auld.



# Cadets win inaugural national drill competition



Some serious hard work and dedication has netted the School's Combined Cadet Force (CCF) a national title.

During the autumn term, a 13-strong drill team from the High School defeated eight other squads from across the country to win the inaugural 51 Infantry Brigade Army Cadet Force (ACF) Drill and Turnout Competition at Glencorse Barracks in Penicuik.

The contest saw the teams perform a number of precise military drill sequences in front of the 51 Infantry Brigade Cadet Training Team, which organised the event.

Having been earned in competition against not just school CCFs, but also some of the typically much larger ACFs, the victory was a just reward for the special training which the pupils had been putting in since April, both in the course of their weekly CCF training days and the CCF Central Camp held at Wathgill over the summer.

WO2 Willie Nichol, who coached the squad, said, "The drill team have been training very hard since April, instructed by F6 pupils Sandy Neville, Max Strachan, Sam Strachan and Morven Wright, and their performance was of a very high standard.

"All three judges were very impressed by the drill they witnessed, with one commenting that the team's standard was at a level you would expect from top recruits coming out of Sandhurst."

### Tina McGuff talks to pupils

In November, Tina McGuff, author of Seconds to Snap, and a passionate campaigner for mental health, spoke to F3 pupils during Personal, Social and Health Education lessons about her experience with eating disorders.

Paula Spowart, PT Guidance (Aystree), said the talk tied in with topics the pupils had been covering in class on Healthy Eating and Body Dysmorphic Disorder in Young Adults.

She added, "The pupils will always engage with an outside speaker who can connect with them and speak knowledgeably about a subject.

"They now have a greater understanding of eating disorders and the connection to mental health issues and feel more confident to talk about this subject."





#### **Enchanting event**

It may have been freezing outside, but inside St Paul's Cathedral there was an enchanting warmth in the air as the School's annual Service of Nine Lessons and Carols took place just before Christmas.

There were polished performances aplenty as a number of the School's choirs, bands, musical ensembles and individuals performed a range of seasonal favourites, traditional pieces of music and readings.

Following the Service, the evening continued with a mulled wine and mince pie reception in Trinity Hall.

# Expert individual helps pupils examine group psychology



High School of Dundee pupils have been examining group psychology with the help of an expert individual!

In November, F5 and F6 pupils who take Psychology as an enrichment class welcomed back to the School former pupil Dr Fergus Neville, who is now a social psychologist with the University of St Andrews.

Fergus discussed with the youngsters a research experiment he has been working on – 'Beyond Contagion' – which examines the social and psychological processes underpinning the spread of emotion, ideas and behaviour within and across crowd events.

After giving the pupils the chance to participate in the experiment, which has been running at the British Science Museum in London, he discussed the findings of his research.

of the Child Convention and setting out the shared values which pupils and staff aim to adopt in the classroom.

L6 teacher Lisa Carrie, who is leading the project, was delighted to see the pupils recognised for the effort that they have put in so far.

She said, "Achieving Recognition of Commitment status is a fantastic achievement which reflects the hard work of the Pupil Voice group in driving forward a project they immediately recognised would have a positive impact on the ethos of the school. Their confidence in sharing their vision with staff and pupils has been a pleasure to see."

Pupils and staff are now working towards achieving the next stage, the Level 1 Award, which, following assessment by a Unicef UK representative, is granted to schools which show good progress towards embedding children's rights in their policies, practices and ethos.

And the F5 pupil had further cause for celebration as her own impressive solo performances saw her end the competition as Scotland's top points scorer; a new personal best of 48.58 earned Sarah sixth place in the individual standings.

Adding to her achievements, Sarah also scored personal bests on the vault and on the beam, with the latter performance gaining her the second qualifying spot for the finals, ahead of 39 other competitors.

Sarah, who competes for City of Glasgow Gymnastics Club and is a member of the Scottish Commonwealth Games preparation squad, said, "I am always so proud to represent my country but this



was very special for me as it was my first time competing as a senior.

"We were delighted as a team to win the Bronze medal and an extra bonus was that I achieved the two qualifying scores for phase 2 of 2018 Commonwealth Games selection process. This means that I can now be put forward for selection.

Phil Godman says, "We are very fortunate at the High School to have a number of boys and girls performing at a high level in a variety of different sports. The aim of the programme is to nurture, enhance and develop these athletes as well as increase the overall standard of sport within the school.

"Getting the right balance is crucial and the programme ensures pupils get the optimum mix of training, academic work and rest time.

"Being able to give our pupils access to sports science, to video analysis and sports psychology – a huge factor in the success of top athletes around the world today – is immensely exciting for the PE staff and we are really looking forward to seeing the impact the programme will have on our pupils."

A number of youngsters have already been drafted into the programme's initial intake, including pupils who have represented their country at sports including hockey, football, rugby, tennis, gymnastics and sailing.

But from session 2018/19, the programme will be offered as an option within the subject preference process for those currently in F2, F4 and F5, therefore making it available for more pupils who have the ambition to follow in the footsteps of former pupils like double Olympian Eilish McColgan, and Scotland rugby internationalists Zander Fagerson, Richie Vernon and Alasdair Dickinson.

The Rector said, "We are committed to the physical wellbeing of all our pupils and have a highly-developed and progressive sport-for-all programme from nursery right through to Sixth Year.

"However, it is important that we cater for those at the top of their particular sports and enable them to perform at the highest level possible.
