HSD Remembers... 100 years on

As we approach the centenary of the first Armistice on 11 November 1918, we have put together a programme of events to mark this important anniversary, to which we extend a warm invitation to all parents, pupils and staff, past and present.

The First World War was seen as the war to end all wars. It wasn't. of course. However, 1914-1918 were four years that changed the world, and at this time 100 years ago monarchies were collapsing, revolutions were breaking out and the political and social landscape of Europe and beyond was being transformed. FPs of the High School were involved in all areas of the war, including active service in the Royal Navy, Army and the nascent Royal Air Force. They also played important roles away from the fighting itself, in military hospitals, in code-breaking, logistics, planning and propaganda. FP nurses were even posted to Basra and Tbilisi in support of troops fighting against Iraqi rebels and the Bolsheviks respectively.

The war also changed the USA's relationship with the world for ever, and hastened the reassessment of women's rights that continues to this day. It marked the beginning of the end for colonialism.



However, in other ways, it was no more than the 'end of the beginning' as the cataclysmic energy unleashed led to the rise of totalitarianism in Russia, Spain, Germany and Italy.

To mark this centenary we have organised a programme of events which we hope will be a suitable testimony to our ongoing debt of gratitude to those whose lives were changed for ever by the First World War and give us cause to reflect on how we can learn from the lessons of history.

War Memorial Rededication

Our memorial to those who served and those who fell during, and as a result of, WW1 records 710 names, including 113 who died. Since 2014 we have been researching the contribution made by FPs during the war and we have discovered 67 additional names: 21 men who were killed and 46 who served. The latter includes the names of 9 courageous women who had hitherto not been recognised. These 67 FPs will therefore be recognised on a new panel, which will be dedicated at a ceremony in school.
